### **Maths Challenge Success**

Following his exceptional performance in the Junior Round of the Maths Challenge, where he received a gold award; George Wightman gained entry into the Pink Kangaroo competition. The Pink Kangaroo is the second round of the maths challenge, only available to the top 10,000 students in the UK, the top 25% of these students gain a certificate of merit from the Pink Kangaroo.

The qualifying score this year was 90 marks for a certificate of merit, while George managed to score 119, massively exceeding this benchmark. Well done George, brilliant work.


#### **Royal Academy Summer Exhibition**

Bishop Peter joined the school on 9<sup>th</sup> June to celebrate Mass for the 50th anniversary of the school's opening. The bishop led Mass at 10.30 alongside Canon David Bagstaff and Father John Warrington. Mass was attended by the pupils, staff, governors, trust board representatives and former heads. The children

sang beautifully to excellent playing by Mrs Lashmar, a former headteacher. Y3 and Y5 provided a descant to the hymns and showed how liturgical music is shared at St Felix. Pupils in Y5 and Y6 led prayers and reading and Y4 carried the offertory. The bishop blessed bookmarks donated by the HSA.

After a wonderful service, the friendly Bishop visited the classrooms to meet the children and see how St Felix functions. He even had a go at playing the drums! Pupils were eager to say hello and receive a handshake. A delicious lunch was provided for the adults and a chance to look at records and photos from the school's 50 years since 1973.

The children all had a piece of the birthday cake and a bookmark to remember the occasion. It was a fantastic day and very special for the St Felix family.

Wrens Class (YR) were stud-


